Excitement Builds for BELL (Building Educated Leaders for Life) Summer Learning Program

Our new BELL summer learning program is taking shape! From June 28 through July 30, we will offer a five-day-per-week day camp to our most recent STAIR graduates, all rising third graders from the Gibson and Whatley Elementary Schools.

Our days will start early, with bus pick up beginning at 7:30 a.m. The children will be fed breakfast immediately upon arriving at the Fresh Air Farm.

Monday through Thursday, we will have reading, writing, and math in the mornings, followed with lunch, and then the afternoons will be spent in enrichment activities. The **McWane Center** will provide special science programs and a field trip, and the **Jones Valley Urban Farm** will conduct the **“Seed To Plate”** and **“Seed To Parents”** programs, with field trips as well. Fridays are devoted to field trips and other special programs.

Learning—and Living—the Word of God

“In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God.” (John 1:1)

These are, of course, the opening words of the gospel of John. I have read them many times. I’ve also listened to them in the car driving back and forth to various locations. I’ve seen some well-produced videos of this gospel, and once I saw a one-man dramatization of “The Gospel of John.” It was inspiring, not simply because of the skills of an obviously gifted Christian actor, but because of the dynamic nature of the Word of God.

I’m not sure anyone has the ability to explain the power of the Spirit to move, to empower, to inspire people of faith. What I do know, however, is that by the power of the Holy Spirit, the gospel proclaimed in faith becomes a living and dynamic witness in the world. The “Word of God” strengthens, comforts, corrects and leads the people of God. Scripture helps us to know and reflect the holy and righteous light of Jesus Christ.

We can learn and express biblical knowledge and faith in many different ways. We can read it and write it (visual). We can hear it and speak it (audio). Or we can put our hands upon it, pick it up, examine it, test it, act it out and practice it (kinesthetic).

Of course, all these forms of learning and expressing our faith are essential. The question that haunts me, however, is “Has the gospel of Jesus Christ moved beyond rehearsal on the stage of my life into a performance that truly depicts and demonstrates God’s Word?”

Living in the Word is evidenced by a natural spiritual progression. We devote ourselves to prayer, to speaking with God and listening to God. We seek fellowship with others in order to be nurtured, cared for and equipped for service. Together we wait for and seek to prayerfully discern the Spirit’s leading, God’s will, God’s revelation, and God’s desire for our lives of service. Only then can we perform, not simply as actors on a stage but as servants girded with basin and towel.

Basin and towel. Read John’s gospel closely and you will discover that these are not just the props of a staged production, they are the symbols of disciplined servanthood. If we are blessed to be called to pick them up, then let us do so with humility and joy, for we are being summoned to the true stage of faith whereupon we act out the Word of God. We have many opportunities this summer to act out—and live-- the Word of God. Read this passage, seek spiritual insight for its true meaning in your life and then perform it as only you can.

“Jesus knew that the Father had put all things under his power, and that he had come from God and was returning to God, so he got up from the meal, took off his outer clothing, and wrapped a towel around his waist. After that, he poured water into a basin and began to wash his disciples’ feet, drying them with the towel that was wrapped around him... When he had finished washing their feet, he put on his clothes and returned to his place. ‘Do you understand what I have done for you?’ he asked them. ‘You called me ‘Teacher’ and ‘Lord,’ and rightly so, for that is what I am. Now that I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also should wash one another’s feet. I have set you an example that you should do as I have done for you. I tell you the truth, no servant is greater than his master, nor is a messenger greater than the one who sent him. Now that you know these things, you will be blessed if you do them.’” (John 13:3-5, 12-17)

A Youth Conference is a unique gathering of young people from all over the country for a week of study, worship, and recreation.

Independent Presbyterian Church Summer Term Adult Sunday Classes June 6 - August 29, 2010 Classes begin at 10:00 a.m.

The **Advanced** and the **Wonder Years** classes join in room 305-307 as they host the summer topic class ***Inclusion and Exclusion in the Bible and Its Interpretation with Samford University's Dr. Joe Scrivner.*** This course examines the continual tension between inclusion and exclusion for God's people, both within the Bible itself and in how the Bible has been interpreted, especially in the United States. The discussion includes both Old and New Testament passages and how these apply to daily life and in God's plan for redemption. **Discoverers** class meets in room 301 with class members leading a study of ***The Present Word.***

Faith Builders meets in 308 to continue its study of ***Matthew*** with class members leading discussion.

Highlanders class for young singles and couples meets in room 303.

The ***soon to be re-named "Parenting 101"*** meets in room 304.

The Way meets in room 309 to study ***The Parables*** with class members leading this group.

Dr. Joe Scrivner, Samford Professor, Returns to IPC to teach this summer

Joe Scrivner returns to IPC this summer to teach ***"Inclusion and Exclusion in the Bible and Its Interpretation"*** beginning June 6 and concluding August 29. Dr. Scrivner, a member of the faculty at Samford University's Department of Religion, will lead this class in room 305-307 during the church school hour.

Always a popular instructor, Dr. Scrivner's other IPC courses have included ***"Old Testament Wisdom Literature," "The Jesus of History and the Christ of Faith,"*** and ***"How to Read the Bible."*** He began his relationship with IPC six years ago and has presented these and other class series during the summer terms.

Samford publication ***Seasons*** magazine in its Fall 2009 issue quotes Dr. Scrivner as follows:

"The members (at IPC) are well educated and want to know what's out there. . . Though churches often use lay members to teach Sunday school classes, sometimes the classes want a scholar to come in to let them know what the experts say. Sometimes, people are hungry and want to dig deeper."

Each year Dr. Scrivner meets with members of the adult education subcommittee and Christian Education Director Paul Romjue to come up with a wish list of topics for the summer session. Dr. Scrivner, a pastor's son and a minister himself, brings together his background and his position as a professor of religion in an opportunity to explain the Bible in ways that listeners find plausible.

As noted in the ***Seasons*** magazine article, Dr. Scrivner adds:

"Adults are in the class voluntarily, and they consistently attend throughout the summer months. When connecting with adults, it's about their faith, not just about this class or that test. It makes me apply the stuff I've learned, and it's challenging and rewarding."

Hospital and for morning worship at

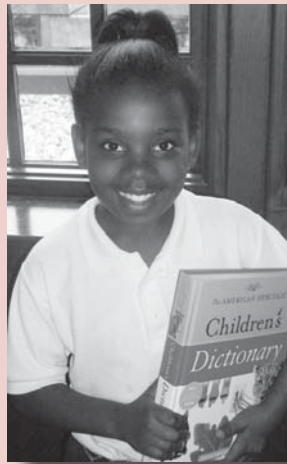

IPC Foundation Fund Honors and Educates

Shortly after Barbara Noojin Walthall died in 2002, her husband, Lee, daughter, Elizabeth Tubbs, and son, Kennon, decided that to remember her most appropriately they would start a fund of the IPC Foundation. Named the Barbara Noojin Walthall Bible Study Series, it would fund in perpetuity lectures given at IPC by well known Bible scholars.

Bible study had been so important to Barbara. She had participated in and taught adult classes at church, and with a few friends participated in a weekly Bible study for over 30 years. So her family sought to inspire others to love Bible study as Barbara had. They wanted to offer the IPC congregation and the broader community an opportunity for serious Bible study on an annual basis.

The scholars chosen over the years have come from prestigious divinity schools throughout the southeast and midwest. These nationally known speakers include Dr. Carol Newsome (*The Bible and the Care of the Earth*), Dr. Barbara Rossing (*The Message of Hope in the Book of Revelation*), Dr. Cindy Rigsby (*Beyond Fire Insurance: Salvation in the Big Picture*), Dr. Cathleen O'Connor (*Facing Loss and Finding Hope in the Book of Jeremiah*), Dr. Christine Yoder (*Forming Fearers of the LORD: A Study of Proverbs*) and Dr. Amy Jill Levine (*Jesus in his Jewish Context*). The lecture series is now well known among Bible scholars so that when someone is invited to speak, she knows the context. An added advantage for our members is that prior to the scholar's visit, a Sunday School Topics class will focus on the lecturer's theme or publications.

Through this important legacy in the IPC Foundation, the Walthall family has provided for stimulating Bible study and has lovingly remembered Barbara Noojin Walthall and honored her faithfulness.

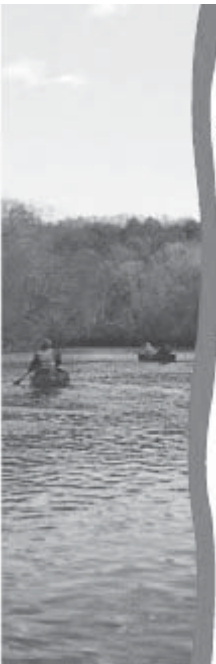
